RESERVATION DAY

If you have paid for at least two months in a site during the 2017-2018 season, you can guarantee your reservation of a minimum period of one month for the 2018-2019 season in your existing site by making your reservation BEFORE March 1st. All sites not reserved prior to March 1st become open and available for one month or longer reservations by the general public on March 1st. If you wish to change sites, call or come to the Administration Office early on March 1st to book your new site. If

you wish to reserve a site for a shorter time period than one month, short-term reservations will open on September 1st. There is no price increase anticipated for the 2018-2019 season. (In an attempt to dispel old rumors, people reserving annual sites have no greater priority than anyone else. March 1st begins Open Season for Everyone!)

SECURITY

SPEEDING – Anthony Quintero, Security Manager, reported that as of the end of January 2018 the Security Department has made 252 traffic stops for excessive speed. Slow Down! 90 residents, 60 vendors or contractors, 90 visitors, and 10 employees have been stopped. Please remember that traffic on Strand Ave. and Cocopah Drive is limited to 15 mph; traffic on Miller Circle is limited to 15 mph except the area around the 19th Hole Restaurant and the south side of the pool where the speed limit is 10 mph due to golf cart traffic; traffic on all interior streets is limited to 10 mph. Please slow down; the life you save may be your own.

Resort rules prohibit anyone from driving across RV sites from one street to another; it is rude to your neighbors and destructive of resort property. If you cause a water line break or cut a utility line, you are liable for damage to Resort property. Drive around the block at 10 mph; that's the rule. We appreciate your cooperation.

WALK TALK & SHOP

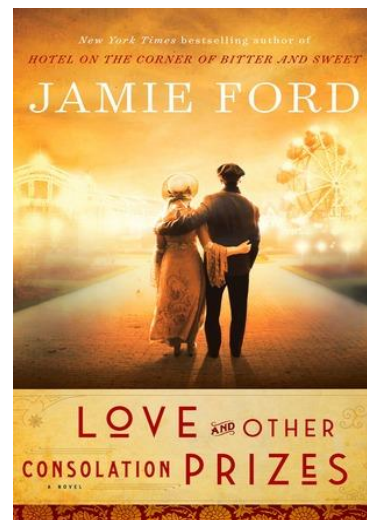
Shopping .. Selling ..

CRAFT FAIR

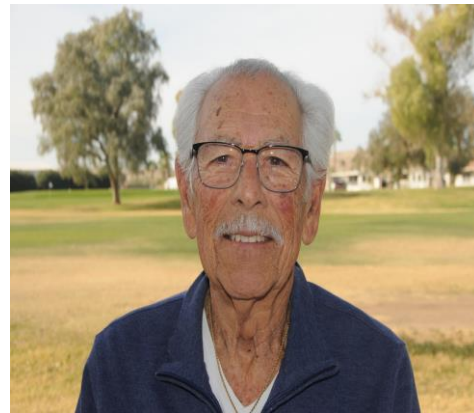

MEMBER OF THE GREATEST GENERATION AMONG US

A “salute” to Aleutian Island Veteran of WWII: George Villasenor, a long-time Cocopah resident.



George Villasenor, now 90 years old, was stationed on the remote island of Attu in the Aleutian Islands as a photographer during World War II. The year was 1944 when George was just 16. George went to boot camp in Farragut, Idaho where he learned to row a boat but still didn't know how to drive.

George's orders were: *Closed Assignment* (secret destination to George). Although he hoped to be assigned to be on a submarine, be an armed guard, or corpsman, that was not the U.S. government's plan.

He finally learned to drive at Fort Richardson military base outside Anchorage. From there he rode a boat to the far desolate island of Attu and was stationed in a Quonset Hut with the assignment of *Aerial Photographer*. George's Dad owned a photography studio in San

Francisco, so the Navy *assumed* George could handle a camera.

George had never been in an airplane so this was an adventure to a “kid”. The aerial cameras were big bulky apparatus with a handle on each side. George was seated in the rear seat of a two seater SNJ aircraft with a canopy hatch he opened when he needed to lean out and snap pictures.

Northern Japan was approximately 680 miles away. Aircraft left Attu for bombing raids in Japan continually. George described himself as a “reporter on base” taking photos of island activity, military equipment, and search and rescue assignments.

At one point the Japanese had control of Attu and the neighboring island of Kiska. Japan bombed Dutch Harbor setting fire to the island community. When Japan attempted to re-supply their soldiers on the islands with food and weapons – a battle on land and air began, with the Japanese fleet turning around and returning Japan. This left the remaining Japanese foot soldiers abandoned. The starving Japanese soldiers were found in the chow lines wearing US uniforms. The Japanese had built caves inside the mountains, so it was difficult to conquer the island for the first arriving US soldiers.

One of the perks of being on the frigid island was free shots of whiskey provided by the Red Cross to the soldiers to keep them warm! The Red Cross had a presence on the island staffed by ladies who provided coffee and Morale, Welfare, and Recreation, but no companionship. The saying about this island duty was: **There is a woman behind every tree.** *There are NO trees on this island.*

George was the last of the photographers to leave Attu. He left the island in June 1946. George returned to San Francisco and finished his high school education.

Thank you George for being a part of the greatest generation that defended our country.
